



- The events must be in the order in which they occurred.

Write 3 diary entries that a character would write that include

- o Diary entries should be at least 10 sentences each.
- Diary entries can be typed or handwritten.
- Fiction (Realistic, Historical); Mystery; Fantasy; Biography and Autobiography

Create a board or card game about the book.

- The game should include details about the setting, characters, and plot to show knowledge of the book.
- Include instructions about how to play.

### **Realistic Fiction Story Elements**

**Characters** – the people in the story, usually there is a main character (the most important person) and supporting characters (all of the other people); put a star next to the main character, or narrator.

**Setting** – the time and place that the story takes place in – remember that time could be time in history (past, present, future) or time of year or day.

**Conflict** – every good story has a problem that needs to be solved, this is the conflict (it could be between two people or a problem that the character has with themselves or nature).

**Plot Events/Rising Action** – the main events (or things that happen) in your story, usually they are building suspense in the story until you reach the climax.

**Climax** – the most exciting part of the story, usually where the problem is solved.

**Resolution** – how the story ends after the problem is solved.

**Theme** – what is the lesson learned or the moral of the story?
